Such is the case with Charles (Chuck) and Nora Joles, and their children William (age 12) and


Carolyn (almost 10). What a privilege it is to get to know this committed couple and their two delightful children!

In 1989 he joined the law firm of Underhill, Joles, where he now specializes in Estate Planning, Wills, Corporate and Business Law, and Real Estate. Chuck is also President of North London Kiwanis Club, and a respected member of the business community.

Nora Underhill, daughter of Betty and the late Fred Underhill, was born in London,

attended Miss Matthew's school, Central Collegiate, and McMaster University. While living in London she was working in Stratford. Since then, the family has been enlarged to include two dogs and two cats who are dearly loved.

When talking with them, it is very evident that each one is loved and equally valued. It is a comfortable, close family unit, and each one feels richly fortunate to be a part of it. Nora and Chuck, as adoptive parents, the only relatives, consider themselves wonderfully blessed to have found these two beautiful individuals, who are easy-going, enthusiastic, willing, and helpful. There are no temper tantrums or moody confrontations, and they are always free to discuss any issue.

They explain, "Families are made up in different ways, based on loving and caring, trust and friendship. They have come together to support one another and all are involved in the responsibilities, such as care of the pets."

They both take their piano lessons seriously, practicing an hour each evening, as well as completing homework, and participating in the FSA Sunday school and Children's Choir, and the Amabile youth choir. When asked why they attend FSA, they answer that they find a welcoming congregation where there is a warm atmosphere and sense of fellowship. The children are well cared for in the Sunday School. They mention Paul and Enid Merritt, Ralph and Corinne King, Heather Bedford, and many others who have shared their friendship. The Joles family wants to be friends, and know that their associations at FSA add much to life experiences.

SERIES: GOD'S STEWARDS DAVID AND WINIFRED WAKE

A brief conversation with the Wakes soon reveals the depth of their commitment to environmental matters. Both Winifred and David are active in the McIlwraith Field Naturalists of London, an organization that promotes environmental awareness and protection of natural habitat. They are the co-editors of the organization's quarterly

publication, *The Cardinal*, and frequent contributors of articles on conservation matters.



The Westminster Ponds issue is probably the biggest and most time-consuming project the Wakes have been involved in. What began thirty years ago as a high school project for David turned into a life-long project to protect the environmentally significant Westminster Ponds from development. In recent years, with the help of the McIlwraith Field Naturalists, the Wakes undertook a study of the wildlife in the most threatened parts of the Ponds area, documenting the various birds and amphibians using that habitat. Armed with this data, and backed by strong public support, Dave was able to convince City Hall to reduce the amount of Westminster Ponds lands to be rezoned for development.

Winifred continues to use her research skills in the writing she does for various nature publications. A former monthly nature columnist for The London Free Press, she now writes for *Nature Canada* on endangered species, and contributes articles elsewhere on nature-related themes. She edited *A Nature Guide to Ontario*, a book featuring areas with significant wildlife habitat and natural history. Currently David and Winifred are part of an extensive network of volunteers working on an updated *Breeding Bird Atlas* designed to identify the nesting distribution of the birds of Ontario and provide data on population trends.

The Wakes' goal in all of these undertakings is to make a contribution to nature conservancy. They are concerned about our misuse of the environment through pollution, consumption of natural resources, and lack of regard for other species. It is their hope that public awareness of environmental problems will help

GROW-A-ROW BEGINS ANOTHER SEASON

"Good air. Good food. Good water. Everyone has a right to these." So states the motto of the Canadian Food Grains Bank which we at First-St. Andrew's support through our Grow-a-Row program.

For the past seven years FSA and St. Marys United Church have teamed up to produce a crop which can be sold to help provide food for underdevel-

oped countries. Some years the crop has been corn; this year it will be soybeans. The fifteen-acre field is provided by the Richardson family of St. Marys who have been involved in the project since its inception. Other members of St. Marys United Church assist with planting, cultivation, and harvesting of the crop.

Net income from last year's crop was \$9,100. The Canadian International Development Agency matched this amount at a ratio of 4:1, resulting in a final donation to the Food Grains Bank of \$36,400. Following reports that the government might discontinue this funding program, many citizens wrote letters to their members of parliament. As a result of the strong public response, the government now appears to be reconsidering the funding matter, but a final decision has yet to be announced.

Meanwhile, planning for this year's Grow-a-Row project continues. FSA organizers, David Knoppert, and Bill and Jean Knowles encourage members of the congregation to become involved through financial donations, which will help meet expenses of land rental, fertilizer, and harvesting. They also urge members of the congregation to visit the Richardson farm, located on Highway 7 fifteen kilometers east of Highbury Avenue.

BIBLE QUEST - A BIBLE STORY CURRICU-LUM FOR ALL AGES!

BQ has proven to be a positive curriculum in both our Big Circle



and classroom times, making Sunday mornings much more enjoyable for everyone. Each quarter focuses on specific Bible stories. Depending on the age group or class, more than one week may be spent on one story, looking at different aspects of it.

Our Fall session looked at stories from the Hebrew Scriptures including Creation, Abraham and

Sarah, Moses, David, Elijah, and The Peaceable Kingdom, and moved into the Christian Writings with the introduction of John the Baptist.

During the Winter session, we visited all areas of Jesus' advent and birth, his presentation in the Temple, the day he got lost in the temple, his baptism, some of his miracles, and a few of his parable stories.

Spring has allowed us to visit more stories of Jesus, the season of his death and resurrection, and will end with a visit to Peter, Dorcas, and Cornelius. This summer will include a look at some of the Psalms, as well as the prayer that Jesus taught his disciples.

Next year's curriculum will include stories about Noah, the Ten Commandments, Ruth, Josiah and Huldah, Jeremiah, more about Jesus, Pentecost, God's faithfulness to Israel, and a look at more Psalms.

Teacher Resource Kits (for all except 11:00 a.m. grade 4-6 class), learner leaflets (9:15 a.m. multi-age class), and activity books (11:00 a.m. grade 4-6 class) add to our time together.

The CD's include various songs (with some really cool beats and rhythms!), stories, sound effects, etc. - all designed to make learning more fun. And sometimes we add dance and movement to our Big Circle singing!

The Committee was established by council after concerns of financial difficulties were expressed at the Congregational Meeting in February.

The committee has met a number of times with the purpose of gathering suggestions and comments about what FSA means to its members, how we can improve, what we should be doing differently and how can we best serve the community. We have touched on a variety of issues including financial accountability, fundraising, rental of facilities, worship, music, outreach, youth and social activities. The intent behind the committee is to find ways to bring more of our current members into church and attract new members to build a strong and financially secure church to serve God.

The Long-Term Financial Planning Committee organized a number of focus groups at which our members had a chance to give us their views. The committee will take the results of these focus groups, along with submissions that we receive, and write a report for council's June 12 meeting.

The committee will continue to accept any comments or submissions and our members will be glad to answer any questions.

The committee's job is to try to determine if First-St. Andrew's is meeting the needs of its congregation and, if not, how can we change.


